March DDTC Meeting Topic - Increase Member Planning Meeting

Background:

At April meeting, Julie raised the very real concern that we need an infusion of younger people to join the DDTC. This has been a concern expressed by most committee members over the last few years. There was a very good discussion amongst the people present at the meeting with many good ideas going into many different areas. As the purpose for Monday's meeting was to complete Swing Left post cards, it was decided that this should be the topic for our next meeting. Because there were many ideas on how to proceed, it was decided to have a member facilitate the meeting. Louie George graciously agreed to act as the facilitator.

Purpose of this document:

The purpose of this document is identify the issue and to define the objectives for this meeting leading to an action plan.

Issue:

The DDTC membership consists of 28 people primarily over the age of 60 years old. A vibrant committee is unsustainable without including people from all generations.

Goal: Increase membership of the DDTC focusing with younger people.

Objective: Develop a plan of actions to be taken to increase membership.

Discussion:

Each member has thoughts as to what age groups the DDTC should target and how to go about doing this to achieve our goal. During the meeting, under 50, millennials, GEN-Z, high schoolers, etc. were proposed. There were ideas about going to schools, doing mailings, holding events, etc. Also, ideas on what social media apps are best. The challenge of this meeting will be to take all the ideas and generate a plan of actions to move toward our goal.

The MassDems conducted a training session on the morning of the 2023 Convention addressing starting and increasing the membership of city and town Democrat Committees.

There were four Democratic City/Town Committee members from different areas of the state. They did a very good job. There was some worthwhile discussion.

The following are my notes from the training session;

- 1. Many people do not know that a Democratic Committee exists in their city or town.
- 2. Put monthly meeting notice in the local newspaper: Appears old fashion but people will see it, recognize that there is a Democratic Town Committee in their town and some will show up at a meeting.
- 3. Have a presence at social events: Setting up a table at town social events and at various ethnic events in the town will provide an opportunity for people to engage and get information about town committee in an informal environment.
- 4. Breakfast/fundraiser: If you have the funding, sponsor a breakfast or some other type of event. Make it free or free for those who cannot afford the donation
- 5. Phone bank
- 6. Post on social media. FaceBook reaches an older population. Consider Instagram, X (twitter) or Threads to reach a younger population
- 7. Arrange to talk to people at Senior Centers in your town
- 8. Arrange to talk to young people at schools in your town
- 9. Partner with other groups: I don't have in my notes what groups these would be. My guess would be to partner with other groups sharing our Democrat values.
- 10. There is a Biden List that can be useful to reach out to active Democrats
- 11. Organize regionally: I think that this meant to organize with other Democratic City/Town Committees.
- 12.Door knock / drop literature
- 13.Engage young people: In High Schools Contact civics based teachers: In Colleges contact the college Democrat groups
- 14. Engage with state representatives
- 15. VoteBuilder: Use VoteBuilder to identify Democrats and active Democrat voters
- 16. Register voters: set up tables at high schools and colleges
- 17. Committees exist for the sole purpose of electing Democrats!
